Financial Fortress: How One Woman Is Changing the Way the Freelands Banks

The Freelands' financial climate has always been volatile, a reality that favors daring merchants but leaves the common citizen vulnerable. As banditry rises and the encroaching Entity threat incites desperation, securing one's precious few coins has become a paramount concern. Enter Abacus, a member of Sable Company, who is leading not a militaristic but instead a social charge to change the financial landscape for the people who need it most.

Started just over two years ago, the Bank of Abacus has grown into a trusted place to store one's coin and valuables. No longer using their mattresses, citizens have been saying how easy it is to store and receive currency back from the bank.

"All I have to do is courier a letter to Abacus, and I think the longest I've waited for coin to get to me is like an hour," Percy, a merchant who travels



between Evenandra and Terra, said when interviewed on his banking practices. "It's honestly really nice, bandits have stopped targeting me because they figured out that I don't carry it all."

For Percy, it's about avoiding robbery. For many others, the bank's

benefits are far more profound.

"She didn't just give me a loan," said Harmony. "She believed in my business when no one else would."

Harmony is the proprietor of a new chain of bakeries, Harmony's Hearth, that is becoming popular across the country for her Potato rolls. Harmony's sentiment is echoed across the Freelands' new wave of women-owned businesses; the Bank of Abacus has provided low-interest loans to over a dozen new shops and boutiques in the last 6 months.

"She's so nice about it, too." Sasha, owner of the perfumery Sasha's Scents, told us in her interview. "Like one month I was having a really hard time because my sister died and I had to close

The Murder of Pitohui: A Lawless Act in a Lawless Town?

Pitohui Von'Ironsbane, one of the leaders of the Chruuch of the Occulatora- a church set up in Maplewood dedicated to Three worship- was publicly murdered in the town square during Harvest Fest. Having openly practiced Darkness worship since the discovery of Decade worship from Vargainen, it was assumed this was the reason Pitohui was stabbed by Makhno in clear view of many witnesses at approximately 1 p.m.

Eyewitnesses report that immediately following the stabbing, Makhno claimed his actions were a direct consequence of a previous attack by Pitohui. According to Makhno, Pitohui had been attacking innocent Sept followers and, in previous months leading up to the murder, had

attempted to take Makhno's life and the lives of several of his friends.

"It had to be done." Makhno said when asked for statement.

Despite the clear public nature of the crime, the Maplewood constables are not actively pursuing a case against Makhno. This reporter has confirmed that no warrants have been issued, nor has Makhno been detained for questioning beyond the initial interview. The lack of official follow-up on an open-and-shut case of public murder is unsettling and has many in the community wondering what the rule of law truly means in these turbulent times.

A private service for Pitohui will be held this Saturday afternoon. Attendance is not open to the public, and no official statement has been released by his followers from the Church of the Occulatora. The complete silence from a church that is normally very open is perhaps the most telling aspect of this entire tragic affair. It seems that while a person can be murdered in the middle of town, true justice, or even a public mourning, is not guaranteed.

Skybeast Assaults in Varganien Continue

Our previous reporting on the Tabernacle incident in Kash'Allum detailed an unprecedented attack by corporeal Sky Beasts.
